Noise control-including minimizing dog barking—is essential for maintaining the tranquility of our neighborhoods.

Additionally, residents should take care to declutter under their carports, creating a cleaner and more organized appearance. It's also important to ensure that trash cans are removed from the street by the end of trash day, keeping our streets neat and orderly. Another crucial rule to observe is refraining from parking in the street, as this can obstruct emergency vehicles from responding to emergencies efficiently, potentially putting lives and property at risk. When mowing lawns, it is also important to clean up any grass clippings from the streets afterward to prevent them from causing safety issues for bike riding and creating unsightly messes.

Keiser's Code Enforcement is committed not just to enforcement but also to assisting and educating residents on complying with local ordinances to uphold a clean, safe, and orderly environment. AUDITOR: "I couldn't find anything wrong!" - By Peggy Sellars

Arkansas State Code 10-4-412 mandates that every school district, county, and municipality in the state be audited yearly. Because the City of Keiser operates a water company, we are required to have a separate water audit. We received the results of that audit a few months ago. No violations! We passed with flying colors.

The Legislative Auditor picked up our documents for our yearly State Legislative Audit at the end of last year. Our financial documents filled a couple of boxes. Believe me, those legislative auditors leave no stone unturned. Every penny received and every penny spent must be accounted for. Those boxes contained:

- Copies of every deposit made with receipts validating the origin of the deposit.
 - a. Every deposit made must be receipted in a book, then posted to the bookkeeping program. Then the deposit slip is made with the receipt # on it.
- Check stubs of every dispersed check written, along with the invoice stating what the check was for.
 - a. Every check written must have the stub and the invoice initialed by the mayor.
 - b. Every check must have two signatures mine and the mayor's.
- Copies of all bank statements plus reconciliation documents.
 - a. We have 17 bank accounts.
- Monthly & yearly balance sheet for each account.
- Monthly & yearly profit & loss statement for each account.
- A yearly general ledger document (60 pages).
- Minutes for the year.
- Resolutions & Ordinances for the year.
- All receipt books and deposit books for the year.
- Copies of employee W 2's
- All tax records and payments (state & federal).

Knowing from experience that these audits usually take several months, we went on about our business, with full faith, knowing that we had done our best. I came into this position as your city treasurer very mindful of the huge responsibility that comes with the position I hold. Even so, every now and then, out of the blue, it will hit

me like a ton of bricks, "I am accountable for every cent the City of Keiser has. I hope I'm doing enough." From day one, I have been dedicated to ensuring the city's finances (your money) are managed wisely — nothing wasted. However, I can't do it alone. All aspects of running a city, even the finances, are a joint effort. I am so thankful for the help and support I receive from Mayor Creecy and City Coordinator Wilbanks, who are likeminded in their endeavors for the city. I can't leave out Director of Public Works Neal Brown and Chief Gattis, who keep a sharp eye on any charges that are made by their departments.

After the auditor had our documents for about 6 months, I received a call from the mayor stating that the auditor wanted to meet with us the following week to give us our audit results. Well aware that an auditor's job is to look for and find what is wrong, the wheels started turning, "Did I miss something? Did I provide everything the auditor needed? "It took so long; something must be wrong."

The day of the appointment, the auditor came into city hall carrying our two boxes of documents with him. The look on his face told me nothing. Mayor Creecy and I greeted him, and we all sat down at the conference table. He passed out what is referred to as exit documents for the mayor and I to sign. He shuffled through a stack of papers for what seemed like an eternity before looking me straight in the eyes. With a glimpse of a smile he said, "I couldn't find a thing wrong." That makes four years with no violations. Is it Ok for me to say, "I am so proud (so humbly proud) of all of us?" The auditor iced the cake for us when he told us that it is not legal for an auditor to advise cities how to correct a violation, so he found a way around that. He has been known to tell them "Call Keiser". And other cities have called.

NOTE: I need to add that this audit covered the financial department, the mayor's office, the police department, and the fire department. NO VIOLATIONS for any department in the City of Keiser. The water department has already received the results of their audit. NO VIOLATIONS there either.

Water Treatment Plant Makeover

Significant progress has been made in the renovations and repairs of our water treatment plant, with completion currently standing at 90%. The pipe gallery has undergone thorough sandblasting, priming, and repainting. Additionally, the building's exterior has been power washed, its facia boards and eaves replaced, and a new metal roof installed. The entire structure has received a fresh coat of paint. Remaining tasks include painting the two filters and the interior of the building, which we plan to accomplish in the next few weeks, weather permitting. Furthermore, we are set to upgrade and replace the electrical system within the plant. Over the years, the electrical components and breakers have weakened, particularly due to the moisture generated by the water system. This marks another MAJOR project nearing completion as we continue to advance into the next phase of our system's revamp.











Disaster Mitigation Grant

In an effort to bolster our preparedness against national disasters, the City of Keiser is set to aggressively pursue a Disaster Mitigation Grant this coming June. If awarded, this initiative underscores a strategic approach to ensuring the city remains resilient in the face of power outages and other catastrophic events that could render critical water and sewer systems inoperable.

Recognizing the vulnerability of these essential services, the city plans to undertake significant upgrades to its infrastructure. A key element of this project involves modifying the sewer lift stations. These modifications will include the installation of bypass connections, which will maintain operational continuity even during power failures. To achieve this, Keiser will deploy a heavy-duty, mobile diesel bypass pump capable of being moved between lift stations to ensure uninterrupted sewer system flow.

In addition to sewer system enhancements, the city will install a natural gas powered generator dedicated to powering the water well and filter house. This setup will

guarantee a continuous supply of clean water, a critical need during disaster scenarios.

The total investment for this crucial project is estimated at around \$234,000. This proactive measure not only aims to safeguard public health and safety but also ensures that Keiser remains equipped to handle emergencies with minimal disruption to essential services. By securing the Disaster Mitigation Grant, the City of Keiser demonstrates its commitment to resilience, ensuring it stands prepared for unforeseen challenges in the future.



Water/Sewer System Upgrade - Neal Brown Director of Public Works

Over the past month, our local water infrastructure has seen significant improvements, particularly with the rehabilitation of our white-water tower. This crucial project was completed recently, allowing us to reintegrate the tower into our water system. With both water towers now functional, our community enjoys a robust and reliable water supply. This efficient rehabilitation was facilitated by prior upgrades that enabled us to isolate one tower from the other. Thanks to these enhancements, we avoided relying on an alternative water source from Osceola for what could have been an extensive and costly duration of up to a month; instead, we only used Osceola water for a mere 2 ½ days.

In a related update, our water treatment plant has been aesthetically and functionally enhanced with a new coat of paint, the installation of new doors and a durable metal roof, which will offer long-term protection against the elements. The electrical system is also planned for a significant upgrade.

The presence of large trucks navigating the alleyways and various parts of town might have caught the attention of residents. These vehicles are part of a specialized camera crew tasked with cleaning and filming the interior of our sewer pipes. This preventive maintenance is essential for ensuring the integrity and efficiency of our sewage system. For those living in the affected areas, it's important to be vigilant about unusual water noises emanating from bathrooms. If such noises occur, residents should temporarily shut off their toilet valves and flush to prevent potential overflows. Once the crew has completed their work in your vicinity, you can safely turn the valve back on and refill your toilets.

Looking forward to July, we have proactive measures planned to further ensure the safety of our water supply. A contractor will be assessing the piping in the front yards of homes to identify whether they are comprised of lead or copper. This inspection is part of a broader initiative to replace any lead pipes found, contingent on the availability of necessary funds. Our goal is to secure the funding needed to undertake these replacements, ensuring all homeowners are equipped with safe and modern water infrastructure.

Sunshine improves your sleep. It reduces stress. Sunshine also helps to maintain strong bones, and helps keep the weight off. Sunshine strengthens your immune


system, helps fight off depression, and can give you a longer life.



Statewide Regulation on Recreational Vehicles in Keiser: Understanding the Law

Residents and visitors in Keiser, along with the rest of the state, should be aware of the state law that prohibits the use of certain recreational vehicles on public streets. This law specifically bans the riding of three-wheelers, four-wheelers, side-by-sides, and unlicensed dirt bikes on roadways. The purpose of this legislation is to enhance safety for all road users by ensuring that only vehicles equipped with necessary safety features and licensing are operated on public roads.

Three and four-wheelers, commonly referred to as ATVs (All-Terrain Vehicles), side-by-sides, and unlicensed dirt bikes are primarily designed for off-road use. They lack many of the safety features required for vehicles on public streets, such as visible license plates, proper lighting, and other road-use essentials. These vehicles are unsuitable for paved roads primarily because they do not meet the stringent safety and environmental standards required for street vehicles.

State law enforcement is vigilant in upholding these laws, with penalties for non-compliance including fines and possible impoundment of the vehicle. This strict enforcement aims not only to uphold the law but also

to prevent accidents that can result from the operation of inadequately equipped vehicles in environments for which they were not designed.

For enthusiasts of these vehicles, the law encourages the use of designated off-road areas or private properties that allow such activities. This ensures that all recreational riding is done safely and legally, aligning with the intent to protect both the riders and the general public.

The state's regulations are clear: public streets are not an appropriate or legal venue for ATVs, side-by-sides, or unlicensed dirt bikes. Adhering to this law is crucial for maintaining public safety and order on the roads. It is important for everyone to understand and comply with these rules, promoting responsible and safe riding practices across the state.

City Street Lights


In the City of Keiser, the 139 streetlights are crucial for nighttime safety, but many of these bulbs, having been in service for years, are prone to weakening, blinking, or failing completely. Fortunately, Entergy has streamlined the process for reporting outages with a user-friendly app available for both iPhone and Android devices. Residents can simply download the app, log in or register their account, and use it to report issues. To report an outage, users should select the #1 "Outage" option at the bottom of the screen, which displays a #2 map of streetlights near their location. If the faulty streetlight is known, it can be selected directly from the map. If the exact light is unknown, users can stand near the problematic light and select the purple dot with a circle on it from the bottom right of the screen to use GPS for precise location. After selecting the light, a menu titled #3 "Report Street Light Out" appears, offering #4 five options to describe the issue. Once the problem is specified, users can **#5** submit the report. A confirmation screen will then verify that the report has been received by Entergy, who typically resolves such issues within one to two days. Reporting streetlight outages not only helps in maintaining the infrastructure but also enhances community safety by deterring crime, so residents are encouraged to report any issues they observe.
